BROTHERS Ewan and Callum Merrett admit they agree on very little in their musical tastes but it seems to be working for Bad Sounds.

One likes pop and the other is into hip-hop — and both want more of their favourite influences on the band's sound.

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Ewan, 25, admitted: "I'm always trying to push the hip-hop side of things, and Callum is always trying to push the pop stuff.

"Growing up, Callum got into pop music and I got really into hip-hop so we come at it from very different angles."

The Chippenham lads also admit they only formed a band together because they couldn't find anyone else to team up with.

Ewan said: "Cal couldn't get a band together, and I couldn't find an MC as I was producing tracks—so we came together and comprised.

"It's a small town we're from and Bath is the closest city, but there's not really a music scene there either. All of us gravitated towards Bristol.

But it's panned out well. They have just sealed a deal with Sony.
They are also riding high with new single Meat On My Bones, which is inspired by a tattoo of a dead dog.

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Ewan explained: "All the songs come from conversations I have, I'm not really good at writing lyrics that are made up.

"In the single, there's a line about someone showing me a tattoo of their dog when it died.

"I thought it was weird — not in a bad way but an interesting thing to do. So it came from there.

He added: "I don't feel I've ever tried to make a statement in my lyrics. Sometimes when you do that, it comes over a bit naff and teen-angety."

"Ninety per cent of my lyrics are out of conversations I've had. I feel it's a good window into our



lives. I don't sit down and think 'What am I going to say with

"I have had my girlfriend and my dad say things, then go 'Don't put that in a song'.

"Most people aren't wise to it. I haven't told the girl with the tattoo, but maybe she's heard the song — either way, she hasn't said anything to me yet."

Bad Sounds are on a UK tour and hit Stereo in Glasgow on Thursday night. And the band — which also includes Charlie Pitt, Sam Hunt and Olivia Dimery — will be doing their best to make a splash without losing their cash. Ewan said: "Callum

especially wants to put on a bit of a spectacle.

"When we first started, I admit-ted I've always found bands to be boring. I went to watch shoegazing bands and they just stood there with no one moving.

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"Then we went to see De La Soul and it was a huge party. Everyone was getting involved.

"The last time we brought a light-up dancefloor for the fans to stand on. It made us lose lots of money, we had loads of balloons all over

the place too.
"The one thing that was s*** was

"We asked people after, did you like it? And they'd be like, "yeah, this venue is so cool".

"We can't bring it on this tour to Scotland as it'd totally bankrupt us. Plus we try not to do the same thing twice. We'll have something else up our sleeves.

"If you're paying to go watch someone, you want to have a good time and dance — rather than just watch. That's what it is about."

And for the future plans, Ewan added: "We just want to do what feels right at the moment — that's worked pretty well for us so far.

"We're playing it all by ear."

JIM SAYS: The Scottish summer festival season has an early start next Sunday with Glas-gow's multi-venue Stag & Dagger hosting the likes of DMA's, Fatherson and stacks of emerging acts. Over at Strathclyde Park by Motherwell, meanwhile, it's the ever popular Stereofunk Festival

Best known as a dance event, it also has its fair share of guitar bands. I'll be hosting the main stage — Jim Gellatly's Main Stage no

less.
Acts performing include Vladimir, Indigo Velvet, Jamie & Shoony, Mickey 9's and Vida, plus 90s rave legends TTF headlining.
Motherwell's very own The Banter Thiefs also make a welcome return.
Singer Keith Condie said: "We've played it

around four times previously. Stereofunk has always catered for a wide range of music ever



since its inception. Although widely considered a dance event, it allows people who might not be into bands to hear what's going on on the other side' so to speak.

"It gives people a chance to get outside and away from the dance music for a bit."

The Banter Thiefs formed around 10 years ago, but have gone through several personnel chances.

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With the departure of singer David Clark last year, Keith now takes on lead vocals. Guitarist Derek Watson is the only remaining member

from the original line-up.
Forever flying the flag for their home town,
Derek was also behind last month's Motherwell

and coming Scottish acts. Derek said: "It was something I'd been hoping do to for quite a while. There's a wealth of musical talent from Motherwell and the surrounding areas yet up until now there's not been a platform to show-

"Motherwell and Lanarkshire has always had great music. Everyone knows the success of the likes of Teenage Fanclub, BMX Bandits, Mogwai and The Delgados. We've got The LaFontaines really leading the way in Scotland at the moment.
"It's important not only for the musicians, but for the town itself to continue this tradition."

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After a successful first year, plans are already afoot for 2018. Derek added: "I'm confident we can make it even bigger and better next year."

It's a while since The Banter Thiefs released any new music, but Keith said: "We've been writing a fair bit recently and have finished recording one track in the studio. We're quite excited about the next few releases."
