JIM SAYS: Initially formed a couple of years ago by ex-Skipinnish members Robert Robertson and Ross Wilson, Tide Lines have been taking the live

music scene by storm.

While traditional and Gaelic music remain at their core, Tide Lines use contemporary sounds to great effect. Former Royal National Mod gold medallist Robert said: "We lean more towards electronica than we did when we played with the Skipinnish boys. To that end, the instrumentation is different. We don't have the likes of accordion or whistle in the live line-up. We are more electric. Even in our pipe set, Moog bass from the key-board is prominent."
They are based in Glasgow, but only drummer

Gus is native to the city. Robert's from Lochaber, Ross from the Isle of Mull while Alasdair has his roots in Alness, Ross-shire. Their debut single Far Side Of The World was released in 2016, followed



last year by the acclaimed album Dreams We Never Lost. Along the way they've clocked up over

a million streams.

Robert said: "The response so far has been great. We've sold over 6,000 physical copies and many more digital downloads. On the day of its release last summer, the album reached number

14 in the iTunes UK download chart."

Their live shows are just as popular, packing out venues up and down the country. Last night they played a sold-out show at St Luke's in Glasgow as art of the Celtic Connections festival.

Most of the gigs on their forthcoming 13-date

burgh, Stornoway, Ullapool, Stirling and Glasgow. They've also ventured beyond these shores. Robert said: "Festival Interceltique de Lorient in Brittany last summer was a particular highlight—also playing in the European Parliament in Brussels in November."

On Friday Tide Lines released a new single Streets Of Dreamers. It is a great progression. Think Runrig reworked by Coldplay. It bodes well for the second album, which they hope to have out by the autumn

Robert said: "The music has really developed as we've gelled as a group. We are still a relatively young band. Just over a year and a half ago we were taking our first tentative steps making music together with Far Side Of The World. I think our closer personal relationships now have allowed us to be more creative and inventive.

Following next month's tour, it's all about festivals, with HebCelt in Stornoway in July and Belladrum near Inverness at the start of August. They are also set to play more European festivals. MORE: tidelinesband.com
