JIM SAYS: I caught Alex Maxwell last year playing a home town gig I was hosting at The Stove as part of DMC (Dumfries Music Conference).
I had to stand on my tiptoes to reach the microphone when introducing him. He's 6ft 4½in and jokes that he might be the tallest singer-songwriter in Scotland.

Though now based in Glasgow, he's enthusiastic about the music scene in Dumfries. He said: "Dumfries has got a lot better over the past year. There is good talent there which needs nurtured

There is good talent there which needs nurtured and given a platform.

"The Stove has really filled a gap both with their monthly Brave New Words event and through the great work by the guys at DMC.

"We've also got The Venue where I'm putting on my local EP launch on February 9. It's a great set-up but pretty big for new artists to fill. Sadly, there aren't really any good mid-range venues for live performance."

The 29-year-old only started playing live three years ago. He got an early break in 2016 showcasing as a CalMac Culture finalist at King Tut's in



Glasgow. Along with BBC radio play he clocked up his first festival appearances last year at Electric Fields, Eden, Kelburn Garden Party, Mugstock and the Moniaive Folk Festival.

The five-track The Want Comes In Waves EP was recorded with producer Mark Morrow in Edinburgh and Washington Irving's Joe Black in Dalmally near Oban. It was officially launched last month with a gig at the Voodoo Rooms in Edinburgh, his first with his band.

The title track, and debut single, sets things up nicely for the rest of the EP with some beautiful harmonies courtesy of Lissa Robertson. The collection of songs explores a few musical territories.

Alex said: "I wanted to demonstrate the range of my inspirations. It blends indie, folk, rock, pop and Americana. I started off and remain a singer-song-writer, but I want to play with a band more often. "There's the simple acoustic song Soul Divine, the sparse instrumentation of The Want Comes In Waves, plus a couple of bigger tracks in Symmetry and Inaction. The band can really rock out live to these two! Rather than sticking to a specific sound, this first offering basically shows the different styles, sounds and interests. The future could go in a number of different directions."

Alex is fairly flexible when it comes to live shows. He does solo gigs or as a duo with Lissa on violin and vocals. He'll have the full five-piece band at the Dumfries gig next month. Alex and Lissa will be joined by guitarist Robbie Huxtable, Liam Russell on bass and drummer Morgan McConnell.

He hopes to rework and release a couple more tracks from the EP, along with videos. He's working towards a second EP to release in the summer as well as UK and European tour dates.
